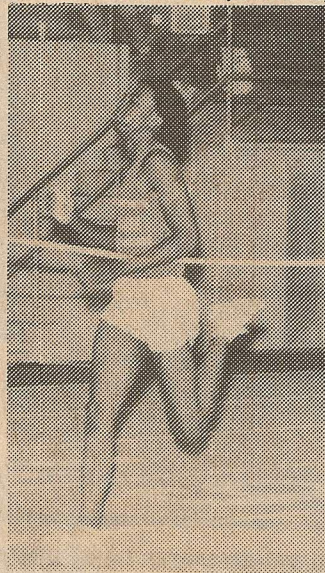

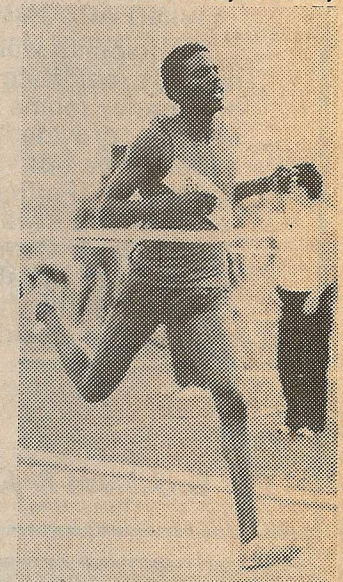

One of the big North-South battles featured two sophs. Quick-starting Steve Jones (Burbank, Sacramento) of the North against strong finishing Henry Thomas (Hawthorne). Jones was in Lane 5 and Thomas in Lane 4. The script was as expected for the first half of the race, with Thomas giving up a couple of meters before his shift into overdrive. The only problem was that the gutsy Jones, with

definite lead entering the straight. Jones kept the Hawthorne star honest to the finish, but Henry emerged the winner here 21.02-21.19. Back a ways in third was Berkeley's Ken Henderson in 21.80.

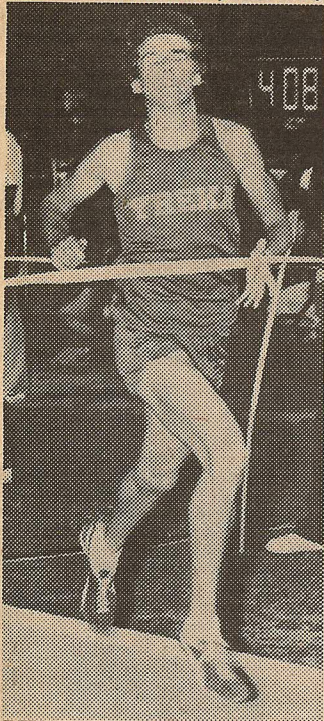

Yreka's Jim Frey, the Northern champion at 4:11.59 had ventured South twice in 1983 to seek competition and escape a frigid winter and spring. Jim was soundly trounced at Sunkist (4:25.8y) and was third at Arcadia (4:12.43). The 6'4" Frey towers over his competition, which is what his running also did here, as the poor spring weather probably forced him into a perfectly timed peak. Running tactically a perfect race, Jim eased in behind Jason Flamm (La Sierra, Carmichael) at

62.8 for 400 meters, then was part of a pack on the heels of Ron Harris (Eisenhower, Rialto) at 2:07.4 (800 meters). The key to running the finish out of the highly touted Southern kickers was a third 400 meter segment of 61.9 seconds as Frey jumped into the lead in the middle of the homestretch before the gun was fired to signal the final go-round. A 59.5 final 400 by Frey (2:01.4 last 800) sent him on to a 4:08.82 win ahead of a threesome packed between 4:10.89 and 4:12.29.

Eric Reynolds (Camarillo), the nation's best prep long distance runner, rolls along with such ease and so totally dominates his competition that he falls into one of the strange traps of our sport. Each week he takes on the best a region can toss at him, then casually destroys them. To the average fan it appears a real yawner of a competition, and there is not really the sense of appreciation the Ventura County star deserves. Again going with his constantly accelerating tactic, Eric had Grant Foster (Monte Vista, Cupertino) as his closest company through 69.7-2:20.0 (70.3)-3:26.7 (66.7)-4:32.9 (66.2) splits. Foster proved mortal after that point, and gradually fell back to the second group, while Reynolds pulled away through 65.0-65.4-65.3-66.2 400 meter splits on the way to his 8:54.75 victory. California lacked its large number of super times over the 3200 distance this year partially because of this mid-4:30's first 1600, then build-it-on-in tactic, as there are not many preps with the strength to run 68-69's through four laps, then drop to 66-67's for the next half of the race. Rene Perez (Woodland) finished off a fine season with a 9:04.66 for second.

A definite Northern strong point, with a foursome from that half of the state under the 14 second barrier a number of times this year. Danny Harris (Perris) was the Southern's best at just over that prep time barrier of excellence. Mark Boyd (St. Mary's, Berkeley) finished off a fine prep career (which included three trips to state in this event) with a domination of the race over the last four hurdles. After a fairly even start with his Northern compatriots and Harris, Mark steadily edged away at the end to a fine 13.93 against a 1.9 meter per second breeze.

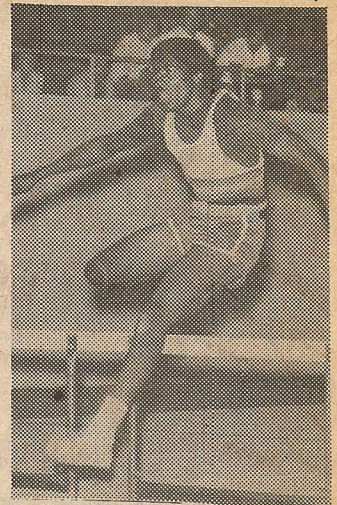

Guess what, another classic North-South confrontation. Erik Montgomery (Independence, San Jose) had taken down the national record with a converted 35.66 from yards at San Jose CC during the qualifying process to get here. From the South came Danny Harris (Perris), undefeated, and with probably more 36.0-36.5 clockings in the event than anyone in history. Montgomery came out smoking after a pep talk from quarter mile great, Lee Evans, and Harris was as far down as he had ever been in the hurdles that make up the backstretch. Around the turn the Perris star, who seems to have a body and stride length made for this event, edged up to Montgomery, and on the homestretch pulled away to a win. The time, a pleasant national record 35.52, destroying by far anything run over the route, and putting a fitting California end to the event, as we will go to the 300 meter intermediates in 1984. For real stat freaks, as we send the event to the grave, here are Harris' touch down splits over the barriers—5.6 - 3.6 -3.8 - 3.9 - 4.1 - 4.2 - 4.2 - 4.5 - 1.2 (to finish). Montgomery was second in a fine 36.13, and Mark Boyd (St. Mary's) got up to third in a lifetime best of 36.14.

In an exciting opening to the men's running events, Edison of Fresno utilized that all-out and a bit daring baton work that borders on tragedy, yet somehow works out just perfectly, on the way to a California State record and all-time Golden State mark of 40.83. It was not an easy victory, as Berkeley was right even through three legs, and Henry Thomas (Hawthorne) screamed down the homestretch from 4.5 meters down to within in-

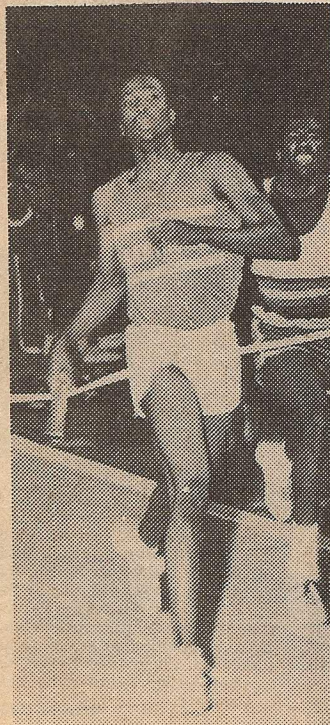
A fitting end to the evening's festivities was an exciting four lap relay. An event dominated by the South, the big question revolved around where certain teams would get the baton to runners like Henry Thomas (Hawthorne), Danny Harris (Perris), and Mark Howard (LB Poly). In the

Southern Regional, Harris had received the stick about ten meters down on Thomas, worked his way up to the Hawthorne soph, and was then run away from in the homestretch during a leg in the high 45 second range. Tonight it was even more interesting, as Harris was only half that far down when he received the stick. Blasting ahead of Thomas as the duo headed down the backstretch, it was a real test for the precocious Hawthorne soph, as lactic acid seems to have no effect on Mr. Harris. Once again the young Hawthorne star handled life on the firing line in an amazing way, as he edged back to, and eventually ahead of the equally determined Harris to win by a meter and a half at 3:10.11-3:10.33. Harris clocked 45.5, Thomas 46.0, while LB Poly's Mark Howard was cranking 45.9 back in third for his 3:13.4 team.

☆ High Jump ☆

Maurice Crumby (Balboa, San Francisco) had set a national record at 7-4½ earlier in the season, but had been bothered by an Achilles tendon injury of late. A fine group of jumpers from around the state would challenge the mild-mannered Bay Area star. Four jumpers were over 6-10 during the competition

(Kenny Burke, Doug Dreibelbis, Sean Chambers, and Ted Gladtko), with Maurice passing at 6-9, 6-10 and 6-11. Things got interesting when Maurice missed twice at 7-0. A third miss would put Crumby back to 6th place in the field, mildly spoiling his strategy. But as a true champion, the Balboa star cleared on his third attempt by a good three inches, and he was back in the hunt. Meanwhile, Burke was the only one to get past 6-10, as he cleared 7-0 (after passing 6-11), then sailed over 7-1, marking him as among the nation's best ever sophs. Crumby played tactics a bit again at 7-1, passing. Again strategy worked as Crumby sailed over 7-2 on his second attempt, while Burke could not negotiate that height. At 7-5, ¼" over the new national record established by James Lott (Refugio) in the Texas State Meet on May 14, Maurice was not successful, as he closed out what had to be a pretty hectic competition.
